Pupils continue to work hard in their Spanish lessons as they extend their knowledge of Spanish grammar and vocabulary, everyone is making excellent progress and having lots of fun along the way. Year 7 have been learning how to describe themselves, saying the colour of their eyes and hair. We


played a listening game where pupils had to draw hair and eyes on their partners, the results were hilarious!

Year 9 have been learning about jobs and the future tense, they can all now say what they would like to be in the future. They have also been furthering their skills in extended reading and writing, and I am so pleased with their progress.



The options group recently completed their assessments for their award in Spanish, so this half term we have been studying some of the cultural aspects of Spanish speaking countries. We have looked at the tradition of piñatas and even had a go at making some ourselves. The next step is to fill them with sweets and smash them up!



Base 1 and 1a have been learning how to say what they like to do in their free time. We've played lots of different games to help us remember our vocabulary, Bingo was a firm favourite!

Year 9 have been looking at Dietary needs through life &

making dishes that are high in carbohydrates for energy. The Pasta Fiorentina was a big hit.



Year 10 have been busy working towards their Food & Nutrition GCSE they have been improving their practical skills by following recipes independently.

Year 11 Food Nutrition & Preparation GCSE class have been busy revising for their written exam on Wednesday 19th June.

The BTec Level 1 & 2 Food groups have completed their coursework now & have been making some impressive meals to show off the skills that they have developed.



Humanities

In year 7 pupils have been investigating tourism in the UK. They have looked at key tourist attractions, why certain destinations attract certain tourists and the positive and negative impacts tourism has on the local area. Pupils will move on to investigating the pull factors of international tourist destinations.

Primary 4

This half term, Primary 4 have worked hard, learning all about the Ancient Egyptians in their new topic 'Tomb Raiders'. We have learnt about the river Nile and its importance. We've written newspaper articles and practised interviewing one another with a reporter's microphone and we have engaged in lots of lovely practical maths lessons, both inside and outside.

This term, we have been lucky enough to have both Yogi Bears and Forest school sessions running and we have loved both! We have looked at lots of yoga poses and learnt about the importance of breathing, stretching and relaxing. In Forest school, we have learnt to use flints, create shelters and have even produced leaf and flower prints. We can't wait for more fun in our final term!



Primary 5

This half term we have started our new topic Tomb Raiders and have had so much fun beginning to learn about ancient Egypt. In English, children have been writing some exciting adventure stories about the discovery of an ancient tomb. The children have loved using their imagination to create story characters. In History, we have been exploring what life was like for ancient Egyptians and about their fascinating discoveries and inventions. Base English

We have been finding out lots of information about the Titanic in English and we are exploring different types of texts. So far,

we have read information texts about the Titanic and found out lots of facts! We have also planned and written our own information texts. Base 1 have also read newspapers linked to the Titanic and we are planning and writing our own newspaper articles this week. I can't wait to read the finished newspapers!

Maths

Base 1 have been exploring measure in Maths this half term. Pupils did some fantastic measuring with a ruler in centimetres. Pupils are also enjoying predicting and measuring mass with scales!

Science

Our science topic is all about materials and we have been discussing solids, liquids, and gases. We spoke about what the particles are like in each, and we pretended we were the particles. We got really close together for a solid, we had a little bit of space for a liquid and lots of space for a gas!

Humanities

Pupils have enjoyed our Port of Liverpool topic. We have enjoyed looking at pictures of the dock now and in the past and comparing them. We have completed timeline activities and we looked at a map of the Albert Dock to find some of our favourite attractions.

Art/DT

In Art, pupils have loved following step by step drawings of the Titanic. I am very impressed with

the artwork created by Base 1! We also loved making Titanic models and portholes in DT. We are now looking forward to exploring our photography topic more.



Base 3

Base 3 have had a very busy half term preparing for and sitting their English and Math exams. In English we have debated a variety of topics and have written discursive texts. Children are becoming more confident in expressing their views and can consider both sides of a debate. We finished reading Wonder and are onto our next novel, Dread Wood: Deadly Deep. Children are really enjoying listening to and talking about the book each morning. In math, children have been learning about fractions, time, and basic number skills. Our Life Skills topic this term is everyday food and drink preparation. Base 3 designed a menu, wrote shopping lists, and
