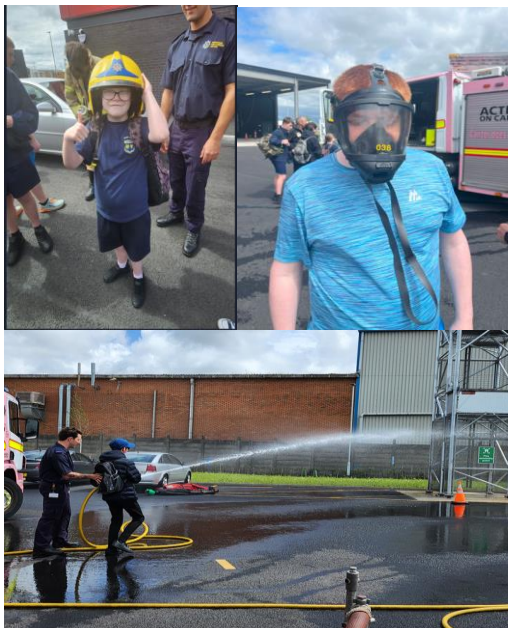


## Maths

We've had another fantastic term for Maths at Bank View, with pupils actively participating in learning and educational visits. ## Spanish

What a great year we've had in the Spanish department! The options group all worked very hard towards achieving their entry level 3/level 1 qualifications. Once the assessments were completed, we started looking at cultural aspects of Spain and Spanish speaking countries. We looked at the tradition of piñatas and then had a go at making our own. We also learned about some of the festivals that happen in Spain, such as la Tomatina, where people throw tomatoes at each other! We

then learned about tapas and tried some... delicious.



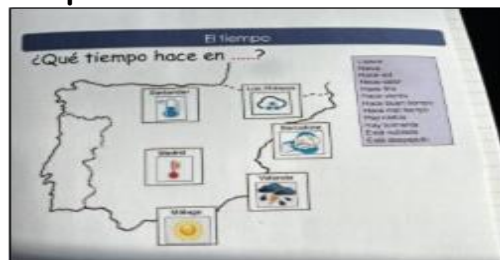
## Year 7

Year 8 have been learning how to give weather forecasts. There was some great independent writing completed this half term.



## Year 9

Year 9 have been studying my favourite topic, holidays! We have been using retrieval games to help memorise vocabulary. And produced some fabulous sentences saying what we are going to do using the future tense



### Primary

Primary have been learning the names of clothes and how to describe the colour of them. This has involved some tricky grammar knowledge, but they have all done well. We made some washing lines for the wall and designed our own outfits.



### Base

Base 1 and 1a/1b have been learning how to say what they which school subjects they like and have designed their own timetables!



## Science

### Year 7

In year 7 with Mr McGrath 7A have been looking into Space and the Earth's place in the solar system. We have raised some great discussions about the size of space and whether life could exist elsewhere! We then moved on to the cycles of our moon and how that impacts of life on Earth, before finishing by looking at how eclipses happen!

With Mr Crook year 7 have looked into the relationship between acids and alkalis and their place on the PH scale. There has been some amazing experimental work done in class and year 7 have done themselves proud this term!

### Year 8

Year 8s this term has learnt about the life cycle of a plant and the importance of photosynthesis. We have discussed not only how critical photosynthesis is to plants but also how it impacts on our life by providing us with oxygen and removing carbon dioxide!

Year 8 have gone on to look into particle reactions and the different factors which affect rate of reactions. They have also looked into electromagnets and where they are seen in the real world such as picking up cars in the scrapyards!

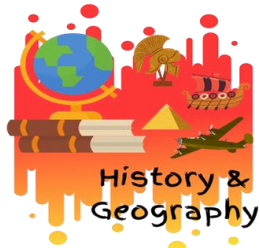
### Year 9

In year 9 we have been studying the Earth's atmosphere and the constituent parts of the earth



such as the troposphere and heliosphere. We have discussed the Earth's tectonic plates which has linked nicely into some the geography lessons! The class was fascinated to look into Pompeii and to see that some of the remains have stayed intact since the eruption!

All year groups have had the chance to witness and take part in some excellent and exciting experiments from Mr Crook in the last couple of weeks, the class rocket has been a real favourite!



#### Year 7- Tourism

Year 7 have been investigating the topic of Tourism. Firstly, they researched tourism in the UK, we looked at The Lake District and how tourism is impacting the area both positively and negatively. Pupils were interested to find out the damage caused by tourism, so they evaluated ways to reduce the negative impacts. We then researched various tourism destinations around the world before focusing our study on the continent of Africa. We corrected any common misconceptions about Africa and they investigated the types of holidays available in Africa from beach holidays to safari holidays and city breaks.

#### Year 8- People and protests

Year 8 have investigated what life was like for women in the early 1900's. They found out that men could vote in public elections, but women couldn't and that parliament was completely ruled by men. We have studied how the suffragists tried to change this by campaigning for equal rights for women. However, the Suffragists were not successful and needed to change tactics. We then compared the Suffragists to the Suffragettes and research their impact on women's suffrage.

#### Year 9- Climate change

Year 9 have been investigating the evidence, causes and impacts of climate change. They have been looking at the importance of reducing the impacts of climate change and the impact climate change will have on the planet if we don't act now. We have some real eco worriers in school.

#### Music

The Expressive Arts Department would like to congratulate and thank all the performers and staff who helped create this summer's show - Charlie & The Chocolate Factory. Everyone involved had a great time and it was a smash hit! Well done all & have a fab summer!





## English

This summer term, year 9 have been studying the play, 'Journey's End' by R.C. Sherriff. They have enjoyed looking at different WW1 medals and discovering what trench life was like for the soldiers. They spent a lot of time researching the historic context of the play and hearing about the military tactics and attacks of the British trenches in St. Quentin, France. They enjoyed reading the play and watching scenes from WW1 to help with their understanding of the war.



## Sensory Circuit

Sensory circuit has grown from strength to strength in the past 12 months. Children are taught strategies which help them regulate both during the circuit time and in lessons. We are very fortunate to have lots of amazing equipment for our circuit and welcoming manikin Bob & Tony to the circuit has been great for our older pupils. In September we look forward to continuing our sensory circuit and welcoming all our new pupils to join.



## Primary 1

Primary One having been learning all about staying safe during our topic 'fun in the sun'.

We have been learning about safer strangers, road safety and sun safety and practicing these when out in the community.

The children have been working hard in bucket therapy and have planned picnics, made ice cream sundaes and packed bags to go to the beach.

We all loved our trip to Gullivers World and had lots of fun in the play areas and on the different rides.



## Primary 2

Wow! What a busy summer term it's been! Primary 2 have enjoyed excursions out, a trip to the fire station, a trip to Gulliver's World and learning about castles. We

2. A Compliment slip from a chemist of any medication that has been bought over the counter for the pupil.

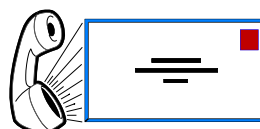
