The Romans are invading!

Join us as we explore the 'Rotten Romans' and how their invasion still impacts our lives today. We will use maps to show the expansion of the Roman Empire. We will learn about the roads they built in the UK. We will investigate different ways of cleaning old Roman coins; try cola, vinegar, lemon juice or baking soda. We will discover what the Romans did for leisure and make our own mosaic. We will investigate the different materials used to create the Roman armour and make our own shields, before ending with a trip to Chester to look at the Roman ruins.

We're going up in the world, visiting a hill, upland area or moor, and noticing how the weather changes. Back in the classroom, we'll use a range of maps, information books and websites to write a recount of our visit.

We'll find out where the highest mountains in the world are and learn how to use a compass and make 3-D mountain models. Using our literacy skills, we'll write mountain-shaped poems and compose songs about the water cycle. We'll also examine how mountains are displayed on a map, and look at the cycle of a rock.

We will act as travel agents, researching life in Kenya, geographical landmarks as well as the animals indigenous to Africa. Throughout this theme, we will discover the colourful prints and designs on fabric as well as the music that influences Kenyan lifestyles.

We will find out about the amazing life and achievements of Nelson Mandela. We will investigate his influence on the world and consider how his message can help us in our own friendships. We will look at traditional African music and how it is used to bring communities together.
